Attending several weddings, including those of Alastair's cousin Peter in May, and his sister Catriona in July (and having to find suitable outfits for the girls..!), being fascinated by apologetics at the clergy wives conference in October, discovering that a very close friend has cancer this Autumn and not managing to attend the wedding of another close friend in Sydney in December. Introducing a rather difficult debate at the Diocesan Synod, and chairing a local 'review group', were both at the rather taxing end of what is otherwise quite an enlightening and fruitful involvement in the wider Diocesan/Church of England structures.

So what of holidays, I hear you ask? Well, we had a pleasant week in a rather basic cottage in Devon in February, joined Kay's brother & family in Scotland for a few days after Easter and took the girls (after two cold, wet summers in the UK to "somewhere hot") to Cyprus in July - managing this time not to end up in hospital as Kay had done in 1992, though she did come home with a broken finger! Alastair enjoyed the amazing archaeological and historical sites, though as it was so hot, the girls preferred to stay in the pool. If returning to New Zealand is ever to be a possibility, holidays will have to take a back seat for a year or two - so if you know of anywhere really cheap, let us know!
