The Nave is less than a minute's walk from Uxbridge Tube Station (Metropolitan & Piccadilly) and Uxbridge Bus Station (Routes U1, U2, U3, U4, U5, 58, 128, 207, 222, 223, 305, 325, 347, 348, 443 and 458).

Ample parking is available in the Cedars and Grainges car parks behind the Pavilions, which are both accessible from Oxford Road. Limited free parking is available in Windsor Street after 6.30pm.
