

ST MARGARET'S 750 YEARS 1245-1995





This year we will be celebrating the 750th anniversary of St Margaret's Church here in Uxbridge. The evidence for the date of 1245 is an original parchment document which records a service at St Margaret's on the first Friday in Epiphany 1245. It is likely that the church was built a little before this date but because it is difficult to identify an accurate date, it has been decided to use 1245 as its date of origin.
