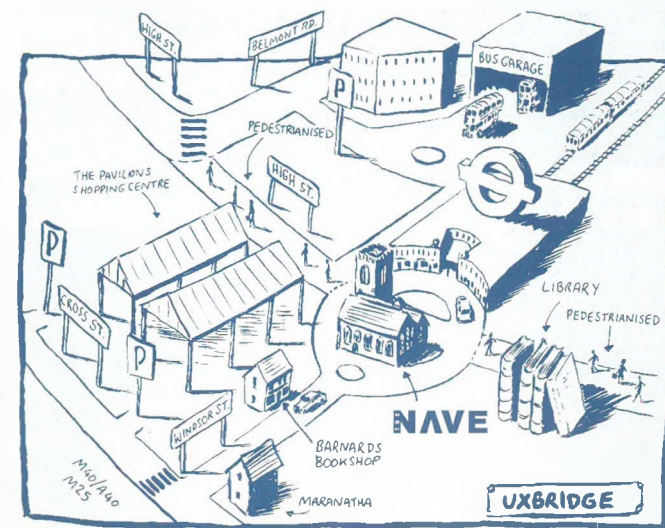


THE NAVE
